Understanding of the brief

- Sharing cricket heritage widely to attract new audiences
- To reconnect clubs with their local communities
- Establishing a model of activity for replication

- 5 – 7 education resources for KS2 / 3
- 3 Assemblies / Presentations
- A promotional schedule to reach key audiences



Methodology

Drawing on our shared experience we propose the following:

1. Review current activity and research
2. **Confirm key partners**
3. Confirm publicity schedule
4. **Build relationships**
5. Confirm themes for resources and assemblies
6. **Conduct desk and onsite research**
7. Develop and design resources
8. **Upload to relevant spaces**
9. Deliver final publicity activity

Impact of Covid-19

- ❖ More research needed to fill the gaps
- ❖ Teachers focussed elsewhere
- ❖ Inability to promote / launch the project

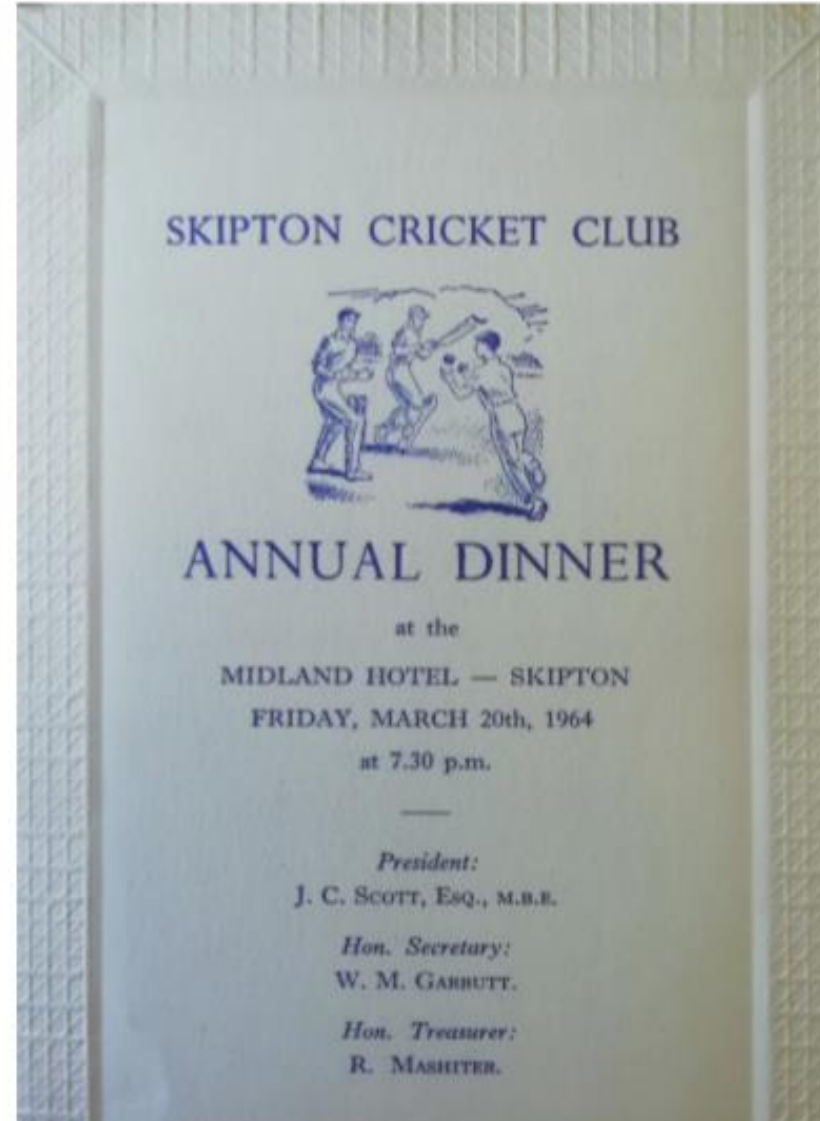

RESOURCE 1

What happened when war broke out?

What did people think when war broke out?

When Britain declare war on Germany on 4th August 1914 people do not know how long it will last or how it will affect their lives. The government encourages people to carry on their lives as normal but soon changes in daily life make it increasingly difficult to do this for many. Thousands of men go off to war, many of those who stay at home work in factories and on the land to support the war effort, and the Yorkshire towns of Scarborough and Hull were amongst the first to come under attack from Germany.

In the early months of the war many think the conflict will soon be over and this includes sports clubs. Yorkshire County Cricket Club, assumes that the war will last less than a year. They continue to plan friendly cricket matches in Leeds, Bradford, Sheffield and Harrogate for the summer of 1915. However, before the end of 1914 they, along with everyone else, realise that the war will last for longer than they had had first thought.
